

Estonian Free Church Theological Seminary THEOLOGY AND SOCIETY

MASTER'S PROGRAM, 120 ECTS

Our goal is to provide the graduates with the skills necessary for a mission-oriented life within society and the upbuilding of churches.

Who is the programme meant for? The programme is meant for people with a bachelor's degree or an equivalent diploma. Preference is given to church members and leaders.

Language. The study process will be conducted in Estonian, however, proficiency in English is a requirement for achieving the learning outcomes. The curriculum will also be available in English if enough students are interested.

Admission and graduation criteria. To be admitted to the programme a candidate must possess a bachelor's degree or a diploma of professional higher education. They are also required to pass an entrance test and an admission interview. It is assumed that the candidate has a proficiency in English corresponding to at least a B2-level certificate. The attainment of learning outcomes specified in the programme syllabus as well as a successful defence of a master's thesis or project are required to graduate.

Learning outcomes. Upon the completion of the programme a graduate is able to...

- reflect on their personal as well as their fellowship's spirituality in dialogue with the development of the Christian church, the Bible, cultural and religious history;
- apply hermeneutic methods to study the Bible in the Free Church context and establish its missional message within their community;
- analyse the processes taking place within church and society through the lens of Biblical teaching and propose justified innovative solutions to urgent problems;
- engage with various factions and conduct discipleship in a way that increases trust between the church and society;
- analyse and creatively build upon the collected data to answer the theological questions raised in their master's thesis.

Methodology. The programme is problem centred. Motivating problems are primarily proposed by the teaching staff throughout the first year of study. Students are expected to start formulating the problems independently during their second year. One problem is expanded upon in the master's thesis or project. Problem centred study is conducted through topic-based workshops that have their own leading advisors. In addition to workshops, personal spiritual growth and the writing of master's thesis is supported through coaching groups.

The curriculum can be completed in two or three years. The in-class study will be conducted throughout the year in six 5-day sessions. In-class activities will be completed in two years and the master's thesis can be written in parallel through the second year. However, if necessary, an additional third year can be taken for the completion of master's thesis.

Workshops or modules (120 ECTS).

Church and mission are the cross-cutting issues of the curriculum.
